

Friday 1 Recycling and rubbish collection dates 2020

- Please put your containers out by **6am**
- **Rubbish** will only be collected inside an **authorised bin or bags**
- Do not put **plastic bags** in the recycling containers. Items should be put in loose

Your collection day is **Friday** except on or after Christmas and New Year where stated.
Collections return to normal the week beginning 13 January in 2020 and 11 January in 2021.

Recycling guide

What can go in your recycling containers?

- **Aerosols** (empty and not pierced)
- **Plastics** (please rinse and squash):
 - Plastic bottles, pots, tubs and trays
- **Tins and cans** (please rinse and squash)
- **All paper and cardboard**
 - Newspapers and magazines
 - Light card
 - Envelopes (including windows)
 - Cardboard boxes (flattened)



Please keep glass in a separate box

- Glass bottles and jars (keep metal screw-tops on)

Food waste

- You can recycle all cooked and uncooked food, including bones
- Please only line your caddy with compostable liners or newspaper
- Place the food bin handle in the 'locked' position to keep animals out
